

### WHY WE LOVE THE ORPHAN'S TALE

Dear Reader,

We began to work on the hoopla book club a year ago, and I have had *The Orphan's Tale* in mind from the very beginning. I am so thrilled to now be offering it as our Spotlight title to kick off a new year of reading!

To my mind, this novel is an archetype of great book club fiction, delivering on all the levels for impactful reading and animated discussion. The book's two main characters, Astrid and Noa, are faced with the most impossible and harrowing of scenarios as they are struggling to survive in Nazi Germany. Noa encounters a train car full of stolen infants near death; Astrid must comply with a state-ordered divorce because she is Jewish, returning home to find her entire family vanished. And these are just the opening chapters, where it becomes clear that the stakes are impossibly high and any wrong move can be fatal in the powder keg environment of the Third Reich. Pam Jenoff's deep historical research for this book allows her to fully bring this period to life, showing how the fear and menace of the murderous Nazi regime infuse into every aspect of life, coloring her characters' every decision and interaction. Yet, the beauty of this book is the way the unlikely friendship that develops between Astrid and Noa, two women with complicated pasts, dangerous secrets, and highly uncertain futures, is able to cut through this deep shadow over their lives. It is a heartbreaking story, but one that is ultimately about the power of this bond.

I think many of us crave reading for the kind of emotional power Pam Jenoff wields in this book, and I think any book club would be well served to delve into her story. It asks us to ponder this most pivotal, catastrophic period of modern history on the most personal scale, delivering deep human insight and compassion for her characters that left me thinking about this book for months after. I hope you'll join us in reading and discussing this deeply moving novel.
